No cultural event unites Europeans more than the ESC, which is also Europe's biggest election. Dr Catherine Baker is a specialist in post-Cold War history, international relations and cultural studies. Her initial research explored the politics of national identity and popular music during and after the Yugoslav Wars, and she has researched the cultural politics of the ESC and other international competitive events for more than fifteen years, including what they reveal about changing relationships between LGBTQ+ and national identities in Europe since the 1990s.
